Some of her recent exhibitions have been at Galatea Fine Art, Fountain Street Gallery and at the Associazione Culturale Sei l'Arte in Venice.



DaNice D Marshall (duh-NYSE, she/her) is a writer and narrative-based artist. After writing for decades, she transitioned to art when a serious vascular disease subsequently led to hearing loss. Despite these challenges, she triumphs and finds her voice through painting. In addition to showcasing her work on a digital billboard in Boston's theater district, DaNice's work has been exhibited in venues, such as the NIU Art Museum, DeKalb, IL; Abigail Ogilvy Gallery, Boston; Piano Craft Gallery, Boston; and the New Art Trio, Newton, MA. Her work is featured in Naomi, a television series that aired on The CW Network and streaming on HBOMax.

DaNice lives with her husband, Ben, and their dog, Tigger outside of Boston. DaNice D Marshall Artist Statement I create Black portraits to connect people and show moments of joy in everyday life. There is a familiar thread, a human story and we are reminded that we are more alike than we are different. Despite an illness that impacted my writing, I began painting the stories that I wanted to tell. It started with abstracts and evolved to Black portraiture. Her series of work called "Along the Wrack Line" deals with the overwhelming amount of debris and plastic trash that contaminate our local New England beaches. Tuck works among her menagerie of debris from her studio at the Mill Contemporary Art Studios in Framingham.



## Denyse Murphy

I am a mixed media artist who works primarily with alternative photographic processes including cyanotype, emulsion transfer & collage.

Cyanotype is a rudimentary form of

photography that captures light and fixes it into paper with an indelible blue stain. I utilize light sensitized paper, plastic sheeting, cloth, string and the bodies of family members to produce the photographs. The interaction of all these elements yield life- sized cyanotypes and explored the self as both a tangible and intangible presence. That all changed when I scanned the images into photoshop and inverted them. The blue caught fire and the image burst into flame.

I am fascinated by making marks and find joy in the discoveries made when working with a variety of different materials. My focus is drawn to the mysteries found in the people whom we know, or think we know, including ourselves. I am interested in the many internal and external forces that come together to form a "self", exploring the ways these define us. From the ancestral threads of family, to our MRIs - we are always being influenced, reshaped and redefined.

Denyse Murphy works from multiple sources/inspirations and uses a variety of media including alternative photography drawing, ink & paint. Her emphasis is to create works that are compelling, thoughtful, and engaging.

### Hollis Machala

Painting is my favorite place to balance things; it's wild and focused, bold and soft, light and dark. When I'm creating, it's because I've connected personally with a subject matter – whether it's celebrating my roots with the Massachusetts Puddingstone paintings or my Fruit Still Life Expressions. I lean into things that make me happy and people who inspire me. When I get to share that work with other people who share my love of that subject, thats when the magic happens. Suddenly, I become connected to entire groups of people who love something I love too. That is why I paint.

Ever since I became healed by the act of painting and put roots back into my hometown. I wanted others to be healed by a little taste of the meaning that gave me life. I started reshaping my own version of what I thought art was. I have a deep wonder of the materials that make up our lives and the meaningful stories behind them. I find the meanings can come from loved items with memory, places, or even nature. I like to harness those meanings onto every piece but mostly I work with water based paints, due to an allergy to oil paint. The style can be described as expressionist-meets-realism. It is boldly colorful and textured, often paradoxically layered with carefully and wildly rendered subjects. A spirit of experimentation defines my use of materials/medium, sometimes resulting in the alchemy of meaningful substances into parts of my artwork. My best known example of this is physically incorporating Roxbury Conglomerate "Puddingstone" into my paintings with the official MA state symbols. I have also worked with, plastic, paper, guitar strings, and a number of collectors' personal artifacts. Incorporating unconventional materials into my work, most often in my commission work, is all about making art with a layered meaning and story. Sometimes a physical incorporation adds something really unique to the piece. I love that process of discovery.

# Kathrine Downey Miller

CAMBRIDGE, MASSACHUSETTS

Growing up, I had a skylight above my bed. The light that poured through, always a different temperature and hue depending on the ever-changing New England seasons, is at the root of my paintings. Through pelting rain, dampened by snow, or seeping through fallen leaves, the light flooded through that framed slice of sky and instilled in me an understanding of nature as a fluidity, movement, and light.

That understanding of nature drew me to other dynamic natural phenomena -- namely, water and fire. All my life, I've spent a lot of time at the ocean. It is the vast unknown, the life force, and I am drawn to its currents, its movement, and of course, its light. My most recent series, "Liquid and Luminosity," I worked in a mixture of oil and acrylic to capture that light. I wanted to create the sensation of seeing the water from below the surface, looking up, and seeing the blurry surface in constant motion while shafts of light cut through, completely still. When I finished, the series contained everything I felt about water and the ocean.

I have a background in illustration, and though these works are abstract, they tell the story. In them, light is the heroine and it follows a dramatic character arc, facing obstacles that transform it along the way. For me, the abstraction in these works is rooted in a process of paring down the beauty of nature to minimal complexity. It is an intimate process of condensing, eliminating and illuminating that is both a creative and intellectual process. My work relies on my strong foundation in drawing and painting, the power of my brushstroke and the peace residing within me while I paint.

Then, working in layers, incorporating the honesty/purity of color, I build up, rework, and may even reorganize the forms. The rhythm of my brush communicates the landscape's liveliness and freedom. Sometimes, to further satisfy my aesthetic, I decide to turn the painting in a different direction. My goal is to share a particular visual and emotional moment; to excite the attention of the viewer; to maintain the (delicate) relationship between human and nature. The series I am working on currently is pushing this aesthetic interest in nature towards an environmental impetus. These new works are inspired by the colors and energy of several emotional images of wildfires in Australia and the American west. These works expand upon my interest in light and abstracted nature to dig deeper into the emotion of facing the detrimental human impact on the environment. At the same time, I am working on a complimentary series of images that revolve around the concept of Kintsugi, the ancient Japanese artform of mending cracked ceramics with liquid gold, as I feel the world needs to heal.

Together these concurrent bodies of work that are still in development present a dire balance between reckoning and facing the realities of the current climate disaster while offering a conceptual mindset through which we, as a species, can approach a hopeless situation with an eye for the beauty in the breakage, and the silver linings, and a capacity to lean towards mending and rebuilding over apathy and despair.

Katherine Downey Miller received her BS in Painting from Skidmore College and her MFA in Illustration from the School of Visual Arts Illustration as Visual Essay Program. Katherine has been exhibiting for many years nationally and internationally. Although trained in Illustration, Katherine has always been a painter, moving between the worlds of representation and abstraction. Working from the line of the land, building up layers and transparencies, emphasizing the power of brushstrokes her work is about a contained chaos, yet in a structured way – whether it be more representational landscape or a movement towards full abstraction.

## Mary Peng

Based in Boston, US, Mary L. Peng is a self-taught multi-media artist, spanning collage, digital work, oil and acrylic painting, mixed-media installation, and photography, whose oeuvre delves into the intricate links between the human body and psyche, reality, perception, and nature.

Peng's paintings are characterized by intricate, abstract shapes and patterns that interweave and undulate, celebrating the interconnected exploration of the human mind, body, and nature, utilizing organic forms and colors to create an impression of oneness from chaos. Rooted in her commitment to expand the ever-evolving relationship between humans and the mediums they employ that "massage" their reality, Peng sets out to capture the contradiction and harmony of human existence through her abstract art.

My latest oil and acrylic work centers on the blending of organic forms with stark contrasting colors, oscillating between the outright exploration of beauty through clashes and the probing of philosophical concepts on introspection, self-perception, and societal constructs. A Modern Mirage serves as a commentary on individuals' undying desire to pursue happiness against a social backdrop where power is built upon incessant material accumulation. Anarchy Within is an outright expression of the harmonizing power of chaotic self-introspection. Revolt in Red and Unsettled are externalizations of the intertwining sensations of restlessness, euphoria, rebellion, and liberation that spontaneously emerged throughout the creative process; they serve as portraits of my fluid psyche in response to the morphing dynamic between a creator and her creation.

# Parker Milgram

WORCESTER, MASSACHUSETTS





Parker is a fine artist, illustrator, and author based in Massachusetts. Their artwork has been featured in several gallery shows and was recently awarded Curators' Top Choice in Juniper Rag's ESCAPE exhibition. Parker's works range from abstract paintings to picture book illustrations and character design. Their current books in progress span themes of friendship, neurodiversity, mental illness, and grief.

The majority of my art reflects my personal experiences with neurodivergence, emotional intensity, and anxiety. I view my spontaneous works as a form of journaling, a method to process ideas lurking in the back of my brain. Often nonhuman creatures pop up, perhaps because I feel so alien in a largely neurotypical society. Art is a "socially acceptable" expression of intensity which helps me connect with people. In public, I sometimes suppress extreme emotions because I worry people would feel uncomfortable, or even afraid. But in the fine art world my chaotic mark making and bright color palettes have been celebrated.

One of my favorite tools to use is the palette knife. The scraping of metal against paper or plastic calms my mind. When creating monotypes, I initially apply medium to a surface and then subtract sections using tools such as palette knives, credit card fragments and paper clips. Afterwards I overlay my final substrate and apply pressure to transfer the medium. For other pieces, I may scrape paint directly into paper or forcefully blend it with another medium such as charcoal.



#### Artist Statement for Blaze

These paintings were part of a series of group shows presented in the Boston area that dealt with climate change and climate disaster. Red is my favorite color and predominates in my work. Ark represents the rescue craft, Blaze, the fragment of an ember carried by self-generated winds of the wildfires, and Conflagration is a photograph of a sunset through the trees that I have manipulated using Procreate on my iPad, so that it resembles a wildfire out of control.

#### Artist Statement for Gates of Hell and Red Meditation

These works were done during the Covid-19 Pandemic Lock-Down. They represent the worry and fears that I experienced during that time. It was a period of great frustration being cut off from regular routines and practices, and a period for reflection and insight.

I am an experimental painter. I studied art in both Boston and San Francisco and hold a B.F.A. from the San Francisco Art Institute. I also hold a M.Ed. from the University of New Hampshire and a M.S. in Communication Disorders from Emerson College. ## Bridie Wolejko

Hydrangeas is about transformation. I've encased dried hydrangeas within discs of resin, like a tromp l'oeil come to life, spilling over the sides of their antique wooden frame. The flowers take on new dimension as they cascade over each other almost mocking Monet's lily pads in their shape and style. My goal with this piece is to challenge viewers' perceptions of nature and art. Are these newly transformed flowers still an artistic representation of hydrangeas? Do they take on another meaning as they reproduce and grow over each other, almost like bacteria or fungus, while they interact within their traditional artist's frame? Whatever thoughts this piece inspires in viewers, I hope they will make connections between traditional and contemporary ways of capturing nature in art.

Bridie Wolejko has been a practicing artist for over 20 years. Originally from Boston, she has now lived in northern Worcester County for 8 years. She is currently enrolled in the Arts Education M.Ed. program at Fitchburg State University with the goal of becoming a certified art teacher. Bridie's artistic experience is steeped in painting and drawing and it wasn't until recently that she delved head first into collage and mixed-media art. In doing so, she won the 85th Regional Exhibition of Art and Craft at the Fitchburg Art Museum in 2021. Her subsequent solo show Hypnagogia was included in WBUR's Summer Art Guide. Bridie is inspired by nature, global crisis, and folklore, and incorporates both traditional and non-traditional art styles in her work.

# Jamaal Eversley



My art is influenced by mid-century vernacular images and explores themes of childhood, womanhood, and motherhood. Pulling from a time in history when the American Dream was being cemented and the rise of advertising sought to define the ideal woman, my work seeks to challenge how we have been conditioned to find our value. This exploration also extends beyond social constructs and delves into the private world of family relationships and their influence, the interplay of power within a family dynamic, loss of innocence, and how the nuclear family construct forces us into archetypical roles.

My work is created with great restraint to underscore the quiet violence within and subjects are presented in a deeply confrontational manner. Figures are constructed with delicacy and care to emphasize their value and environments are virtually non-existent to bring the subject into a position of importance.

Equally inspired by Paul Rand and Alice Neel, my approach to creation has been informed by both my career in design and American feminist portraiture.

Dana studied both design and painting and holds a BFA from Brooklyn College in Brooklyn, New York. Her experience as a graphic designer shows in her approach to shape, color, image generation, and can be seen readily in her work. She was born in 1982 in Dallas, Texas, grew up in New Jersey, Spain, and Massachusetts, and as a joyous New Englander, currently lives in Boston, MA.


Being born into a conservative area of the country, Scott's paintings get a visceral response and many seek understanding of what they see in his layers of body parts, creatures and forms. Surrealists "celebrate absurdity, with outlandish perplexing ideas, the illogical and irrational look at the world."

Like most artists, a deep artistic vision drives the work. Boilard's unrestful mind is a vast labyrinth of subconscious creativity with photographic precision often being expressed by drawing from pure memory. His work is often misunderstood by the common gaze of viewers that do not understand his subject matter in depth that is proposed by bizarre imagery and unjulating and unsettling juxtapositions, as well pure fantastical art, not unlike Bacon. Despite the existentialist and seemingly bleak outlook, Boilard is wildly charismatic, with in-depth knowledge of art and world history that drives his often obsessive care in his work.

Boilard is truly a master of his domain, a celebrator of vision and avant-garde art, the likes few have seen up close and personal. He is able to transcribe his dreams and visions into works of art, with impressionistic renderings of transparent layers and brilliant light. He is the real deal.

"I am a painter in a surrealist representational vein. I work in different series although most often figurative. I experiment with concepts that balance my love of rendering expressionist art. Within representation, I deal with abstract concepts through fantastic subject matter. My paintings are for pure expression, to express what I can't explain with words—

"Boilard describes his work as figurative surrealism, but will himself add that there is a heavy focus on the surrealism aspect. With realistic figures and forms, occasionally dark imagery, strong tone and visual appeal. Boilard is in a class of his own." -- Josh Lyford







Gestural and non-objective, my work is subconsciously but strongly informed by my years as a plein air landscape painter. I continue to be drawn to the same organic shapes and marks, rich textures, and earthy palette.

Embracing the physicality of oil paint, I find beauty and excitement in the way it behaves with a wide variety of mark-making tools and different surfaces. Starting with random marks and no intention, I proceed to respond to what is happening on the canvas moment-by-moment. Each painting undergoes many orientation changes and composition and color shifts. Juxtaposing thick and thin, opaque and transparent, adding and scraping out, makes for dynamic compositions and intriguing details in up-close viewing. The finished works are textural and consist ofmany layers, with only hints of the beginnings remaining.

I find the uncertainty of working in this process-driven approach engrossing and intensely satisfying.

Linda Packard holds a BA in Studio Art from Smith College with a concentration in drawing and printmaking. She continued study at the Boston Etching Studio and at the Kaji Aso Studio/Gallery, Boston, as well as typography and book arts at Northeastern University. From 2009 to 2013 Packard was a student of the late master painter, Jon Imber, of Boston and Stonington, Maine.

A native of central Massachusetts, Packard has lived in Maine—currently in Bangor—since 1985. She has been active in the Maine arts community and maintains a full-time painting studio in downtown Bangor.

# Edward Lilley

Over the years, I have developed a new technique of deforming paper, often randomly, and then flattening it out a bit and then painting it. I can use either spray can painting or air brush painting, invariably applied at an acute angle with a variety of colors.

The deformed paper or card can be typically one to two inches deep with a variable topography. This creates interesting optical effects. The colors changes slightly with the angle of the incident light. My goal is beauty.

In this current show, Artists on Fire, I continue my exploration of art making use of my method.

I have been showing locally for more than ten years when I started with glass art.

My latest news is that I won an honorable mention award at the current Arts Worcester Biennial Curated by Conor Moynihan of RISD. My painting Colorama received much interest and is probably the best of my three dimensional art.

# Charles Suggs

I began drawing with smoke after a trip to Cape Town, South Africa, in 2018. When using smoke, I tilt the canvas at an angle toward me and move the candle gesturally. It resembles how I'd paint without letting the flame touch the surface. Instead, the smoke curls upward towards the surface, depositing soot as the candle's flame swirls. The effect conjures a sense of impermanence, like the ebb and flow of memories. I am fascinated by how such a small flame can produce smoke covering large surfaces.

I started my art career at a later age than many. I received my BFA from Umass Boston in 2015 and my MFA from Boston University in 2020. I reside in Cambridge, MA, and have a studio at the Boston Center for the Arts in Boston's South End neighborhood.

Tension exists between the serenity of the subjects and the violence that creates them. The smoke is like a human residue that implies trauma.

#### Smoke Signals, 2023

This monoprint juxtaposes the organic shapes and colors of the forest aflame with the unnatural monochromatic geometry of the city under its influence. There is symmetry and contrast in the cause and effect. The smoke is a distress signal. What is the response?

Chelsea continues to portray art with a stament that makes people think more deeply and act with determination.




